Have you ever tried to run from God? I'm pretty sure we have all tried. Maybe some of you are still running. This month we will look at one of the most famous stories of the Bible, Jonah and the Big Fish. We will see what happened to Jonah when he ran from God.

Jonah was a prophet who lived in Israel. He lived in the time of King Jeroboam II (2 Kings 14:25) which meant he lived 25-50 years before the fall of Israel (around 722 BC). At the time, Assyria was the most powerful nation in the world and was the enemy of Israel. The capital of Assyria was a large city called Ninevah.

God gave Jonah specific instructions – go to Ninevah and call out against it. Instead of obeying, Jonah bought a boat ticket to Tarshish. *Jonah 1:1-3*. Jonah lived in Israel. Ninevah is 500 miles east of Israel. Can you guess which direction Tarshish is from Israel? You got it, West. Tarshish is actually a city in the southern part of Spain, over 2500 miles west. Jonah was trying to run as far away from Ninevah as he could. But notice what the Bible says – Jonah was running away from the presence of the Lord.

But the Lord hurled a great wind upon the sea, and there was a mighty tempest on the sea, so that the ship threatened to break up. – Jonah 1:4

While Jonah slept in the lowest part of the boat, the sailors were fighting against the storm. The sailors were throwing cargo over and crying out to their gods. When they found Jonah sleeping, they woke him and implored him to cry out to his gods. They then cast lots to see who was at fault. The lot fell on Jonah so they asked him why this trouble has come upon them and what they could do about it (*Jonah 1:5-11*).

He said to them, "Pick me up and hurl me into the sea; then the sea will quiet down for you, for I know it is because of me that this great tempest has come upon you." – Jonah 1:12

Jonah knew he was running from God. Jonah knew that the storm was because of him. Jonah knew that if he got off the boat, the storm would stop. Yet, Jonah was not going to jump off the boat himself. He told the men to throw him overboard.

So they picked up Jonah and hurled him into the sea, and the sea ceased from its raging. – Jonah 1:15

Jonah didn't put up a fight when the men threw him overboard. He literally wanted the men to throw him overboard. He was so focused on himself that he wasn't willing to voluntarily jump to save the crew, he wanted the men to kill him. Maybe he thought he would be a sacrifice for the men if they threw him overboard. Maybe he thought God would hold the men accountable if they threw him overboard. We don't know why he wouldn't jump; we just know he wouldn't jump.

And the Lord appointed a great fish to swallow up Jonah. And Jonah was in the belly of the fish three days and three nights. – Jonah 1:17

This is an amazing miracle. Jonah lived within the belly of a fish for three days and three nights. Sometimes God goes to extreme measures to get our attention. Jonah was running from God, ready to die instead of repenting, yet God sent a fish to save his life. In the belly of the whale, Jonah repented and got right with God (*Jonah 2:1-9*).

And the Lord spoke to the fish, and it vomited Jonah out upon the dry land. – Jonah 2:10

Cont. Jonah got a second chance. How many of you are running from God? I know many of you reading this right now have grandmas and moms who are at this moment on their knees praying for you. You are running from God. So here is the question, who will outlast who? Will you continue to run from God and outlast your praying grandma or praying mom? I don't think so. Your praying grandma and praying mom are more tenacious in their prayers than you are in your stubbornness.

I am a result of a praying grandma and praying mom. Even though I grew up in church, I didn't serve the Lord in high school. However, I had a deep conviction of sin, which I knew came from the prayers of my grandma and mom. In my freshman year in college, the Lord spoke to me through one of my friends after church. He said something along the lines, "You know Mike, you probably shouldn't go out partying on Saturday nights and go to church on Sunday mornings". In that moment, I knew God was saying to me, "choose today whom you will serve" and I stopped running from God. I haven't looked back since.

I believe some of you are at that same crossroads – "choose today whom you will serve". If you want to stop running from God, ask God to forgive you of your sins and make Jesus the Lord of your life. Reach out to Growth Ministries and they will be able to get you some tools to help you with your new walk of faith.

Jonah got a second chance. This time, when God told him to go to Ninevah, he obeyed. Jonah proclaimed destruction upon Ninevah and the city repented. Even the king took part of the fasting and putting on sackcloth. This was a city of over 100,000 people and they all repented! What a miracle! What a revival!

When God saw what they did, how they turned from their evil way, God relented of the disaster that he had said he would do to them, and he did not do it. – Jonah 3:10

How do you think Jonah would respond to this? His life was just saved even though he was thrown into the sea in the midst of a storm. He lived three days in the belly of a fish. God gave him a second chance and when he obeyed God, the city repented and God didn't destroy the city.

So Jonah became angry. *Jonah 4:1-3* What? He just saw a miracle of over 100,000 people repenting and he became angry? And now he wants to die? This is crazy! What is going on inside of Jonah? Let's throw out some ideas. Remember, Ninevah was a wicked city and the capital of the Assyrians, the enemy of Israel. Maybe Jonah was hopeful that God would wipe out Ninevah and he ran away from God so the city wouldn't have a chance to repent. Maybe he was thinking by sacrificing himself, then he would be destroying the enemy. But if that was the case, wouldn't he have voluntarily jumped off the boat when it was in the midst of a storm? Maybe he felt like the city was so sinful that it shouldn't have the chance to repent. We don't exactly know why he was angry; we just know he was angry.

God calls him on his anger. He answers by growing a plant to give Jonah shade then destroying that plant (*Jonah 4:5-8*). This made Jonah even more angry because the plant died. *Jonah 4:9-11*

I am thankful for the God's mercy. He was patient with Jonah. He was patient with Jonah when he ran away. He was patient with Jonah when he wouldn't jump off the ship. He was patient with Jonah for three days while he was in the belly of the fish. He was patient with Jonah when he got upset over the city repenting. He was patient with Jonah when he got upset over the plant dying. I am thankful that he is also patient with me when I act like Jonah and make stupid decision. God is also patient with you.

Pastor Mike has been writing some great articles about the men in the Bible. As his wife, he asked me to write some articles about the women in the Bible, and I have decided to write the first one about Eve. She is the first woman in the Bible and her story is found in Genesis 2 and 3. After reading about Eve, I believe that there are many things we can learn from her.

The first thing we can learn from Eve is that she was created to be Adam's helper. God saw that Adam was alone and he needed a helper comparable to him (Gen 2:18). God first brought all the animals to Adam to name and see if any of them could become that helper for him, but none of them were comparable (Gen 2:20). So, God took one of Adam's ribs and created Eve. If God had taken from his head, she would have been above Adam, or if from his foot, she would have been below Adam. By taking the rib from Adam, God took from his side meaning that Eve is equal to Adam. This is important to know that women are equals to men as that is how God created women.

A helper is someone who comes to the aid of someone else. This means to give help, support or assistance to someone. Women are to be that person for their husbands. We are to be there for them, support them and help them. I try to treat my husband like he is a king. Not that he is better than me, but that he feels valued, cherished, supported and taken care of. And when I do, he also wants to treat me like a queen and I feel valued, cherished, supported and taken care of as well.

God told Adam that he could eat from any tree in the garden except the tree of knowledge of good and evil (Gen 2:16-17). Eve knew God had told them not to eat of this one tree (Gen 3:2-3), but the serpent was very convincing, and Eve listened to the serpent (Gen 3:1-5). How many times in our lives do we hear the wrong voices speak to us and we listen to those voices? Another thing we can learn from Eve is that we need to listen, hear and obey the voice of God, not the voice of the enemy. To know the voice of God, we need to be in His Word and prayer daily and we need to listen for His voice. We will not know His voice if we do not spend time with Him. The more time I spend with God, the more I recognize His voice over the other voices in my head. I find freedom and peace when I know that I am hearing from God and obeying what He wants for me.

Not only did Eve listen to the serpent, but she was persuaded to eat the fruit that God had told her and Adam not to eat (Gen 3:6). The serpent manipulated her by telling her that she won't die; rather, she would become like God. She believed what the serpent said and ate the fruit and gave some to Adam and he ate it. Is it possible that the serpent manipulated both of them? Adam and Eve walked with God in the garden. They knew God and still they were easily swayed. How much more are we easily swayed from our beliefs and convictions? We need to be strong in our faith to be able to fight against the attacks that the enemy throws at us daily. "In all circumstances take up the shield of faith, with which you can extinguish all the flaming darts of the evil one" (Eph 6:16). To stop the enemy we need more faith, to have more faith we need more of God, to have more of God we need to spend time with Him.

After eating the fruit, Adam and Eve covered themselves and hid from God (Gen 3:7-8). This is when sin entered into the world, and I believe this was when self-awareness entered into the world as well. Up until this point, they had not noticed themselves or that they were naked. They probably had not even thought of themselves yet, but now they did

Cont. and what they saw in themselves made them hide. Why did they hide? Shame, guilt, self-awareness, doubt, fear? Yes, I believe all of these and more feelings came since sin was now in the world. I cannot imagine what that must have been like to go from a life without sin to having sin in an instant. There must have been a lot of thoughts and emotions going through them at that time. God knows everything. He knew what they had done and where they were, but they hid none the less. Why do we hide from God? Shame, guilt, fear, doubt, hurt, etc. All the same reasons that Adam and Eve hid. Why do we think He doesn't know everything? As long as we are vulnerable and transparent with God, He will always be faithful to be with us and help us. We do not need to hide from God, we need to draw near to Him. "Draw near to God, and He will draw near to you" (James 4:8).

When God asked Adam if he had eaten from the tree, Adam blamed Eve. When God asked Eve, she blamed the serpent (Gen 3:11-13). They both put the blame on someone else and did not admit that they had sinned, nor did they repent from their sin and run back to God. How often do we do the same when we sin and blame others and run from God instead of running to God? We are human, we are not perfect, we will sin, but how do we react when we do sin? That is when our character shows. Do we blame others? Do we hide our sin from others and from God? Or do we take the blame and run to God and repent of our sin? That is how we are to show our faithfulness and commitment to God, by admitting that we have sinned and repenting to God so we do not sin anymore. "If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness" (1 John 1:9). God wants to forgive us and bring us back in right relationship with Him.

There are consequences when we sin. These were Eve's consequences to her sin: she will have pain in childbirth, her desire will be for her husband and her husband will rule over her (Gen 3:16). A lot of the time we believe we can just repent and everything is going to be just fine. Sometimes that is the case, but sometimes we have consequences to our sins and we have to remember that that is a possibility. God is a just God. Another consequence for Adam and Eve was that they were banished from the garden and had to learn to live on their own (Gen 3:23-24). I cannot image how hard that would have been as they were living in Paradise and God took care of all their needs. The biggest consequence to their sin was that they were now separated from God. They were used to walking with God in the garden and now they no longer would have that privilege. What a sad day. I wonder how much regret they lived with from that day on.

One thing that I think is amazing is that after all that Adam and Eve did, God still took care of them. "And the Lord God made for Adam and his wife garments of skins and clothed them" (Gen 3:21). God made them clothes before He sent them out of the garden. Did He need to do that? No, I don't believe so. This shows that God still loves us and cares for us even when we sin. That is comforting to me, that even when I mess up, He still loves me and takes care of me.

Some things we can learn from the life of Eve are: women were created to be equal to men and the helper of men, to listen and obey the voice of God not the voice of the enemy, to have more faith so we do not fall for the enemies lies and manipulations, to be vulnerable with God not hide from Him, to not blame others but ask for forgiveness for our sins, understand that there are consequences to our sins, and be thankful that God still loves and cares for us. God wants us to walk in a right relationship with Him, but to do that we need to deal with the sin in our lives and work on our relationship with Him.

In the Bible, I Kings 13:7-24 tells of a prophet of God who visited the king of Judah. After a series of events, the king tried to convince the prophet to come to his home so he could reward the prophet.

The prophet adamantly refused. He told the king that even if the king were to give him half his house, the prophet would not go there nor would he eat or drink there. The prophet said the Lord had distinctly told him not to eat or drink anything, nor return home the way he came.

So he started home a different way than he came.

On that prophet's way home, an older prophet heard about him. The older prophet went in search of the young prophet and found him.

The older prophet verified the younger prophet was the one who had just come from Judah. The older prophet asked the younger prophet to come home and eat with him.

The younger prophet told the older prophet exactly what he had told the king—that he could not go with him because the Lord had specifically told him not to eat or drink anything and to go home by a different route.

The older prophet told the younger prophet that he too was a prophet and that the Lord had told him to bring the younger prophet back to his home to eat and drink. The older prophet lied.

Out of respect and regard for the age and position of the elder prophet, the younger prophet went with him and ate bread and drank water.

The story doesn't end well for the younger prophet. Because he disobeyed what the Lord had told him, a lion attacked him on his way home.

You may be wondering why I've told you this story. The reason is this; sometimes when God tells us something, others whom we trust tell us something different than what we feel the Lord has told us.

That person might be a person we love and respect, or even someone we hold in high esteem. It might be someone in a position of authority. Because we do have regard for that person and their position of authority, it is sometimes easy for us to doubt ourselves and what we feel we heard. It is easy to be swayed by them because they are Christians too.

I strongly suggest you listen to counsel from more mature Christians. It is always good to consider and pray about what they say.

However, when you feel the Lord has told you something or even if you feel in your heart there is something you should or should not do, do not be easily influenced to do something different.

Examine your heart. Check your intents and motives. Is it something you feel deep within you should do or should not do? If so, hold firm to your conviction. Trust yourself.


