## THE GIFT

If we were asked to define the word “gift”, the first thing that would come to mind for most of us would be “something received from someone else with no strings attached”. On Christmas day, we receive gifts from friends and family in all different forms; toys, money, clothes, electronics. The one thing these gifts all have in common is that they are given out of love, with no expectation of receiving anything in return, except maybe a heartfelt “thank you”.



Christmas is a time when many believers associate the tradition of giving gifts with one of the most incredible acts of love by God. It’s a time when we celebrate the birth of Jesus, God’s greatest gift to mankind. Christmas is not just about baby Jesus being born in a stable, wrapped in swaddling clothes and laid in a manger. It’s really about a miraculous event when God became a human in the Person of Jesus. So when you think about it, God was really giving us a part of Himself. Through Jesus Christ, not only have we received the gift of salvation, but we have the opportunity for a direct relationship with God.

As we become more mature in our walk, and strive to be more like Him, we discover a deeper sense of satisfaction when we are able to share our gifts with others. It’s a simple statement but so true - “It’s better to give than to receive!” Think about your gifts. What has God placed in you that He wants you to share with others? Gifts are not always tangible things that have a physical presence or things that can be touched. Sometimes the intangibles have a far greater impact on the lives of others than anything we could buy off the shelf; a smile, an encouraging word, compassion, patience, unselfishness, humility. These are some of the attributes of Jesus Christ. If God has placed them in you, they should be shared freely and often, without expecting anything in return.

As a child, I can remember hearing some of the old folks say “Every day is Christmas at my house”. They were referring to the fact that their children received everything they needed, and most everything they wanted on a regular basis. They didn’t have to wait until December 25th to be a blessing to their family. Can you say every day is Christmas in your house? Are you blessing others on a daily basis? If you’re not, then today is a good day to start. Smile at that person who walks by you each day with a frown on his face. Encourage someone who lacks self-confidence. Tell them you believe in them, and God is able! Lend a compassionate ear when someone wants to vent their frustrations, even if you know you can’t do anything to change their situation. Have patience and don’t write off that one person who has issues when you know they’re trying to do better. Don’t be selfish with others. When you find something good, share it. Be humble and never too proud to admit when you’re wrong, to apologize, and to thank the person that cared enough about you to correct you. Each of these attributes is a gift from God so share your gifts!

Have you ever thought about what the words “seeking whom he may devour” mean? Many have heard this phrase of well-known scripture but it always struck me as odd. The problem with it (as I realized years after hearing it) is that it denotes “hunting”.

When we read 1 Peter 5:8, it is natural to think of a giant, ferocious, man eating lion. Take a minute and picture the giant teeth, huge claws, and majestic mane. But here in lies the problem...those lions don't “hunt”. Those are male lions. They protect the “pride” and have even been known to run hyenas down over 20 miles to keep territory safe.

However, hunting is done by the females of the “pride”. They don't do it by themselves either, but in packs. If you're unlucky enough to see one stalking you, there could be anywhere from two to ten that you don't see that have already taken position around you.

This is much like the temptation of sin that the enemy injects into our lives. Just like in Ephesians 6:16, the enemy doesn't throw one dart. He throws many darts, looking for a weakness in our armor.

I remember once watching a documentary about tribesmen in Africa. Three of them were watching a pack of lionesses run down a gazelle. As one of them was finally dispatching the creature, one of the men turned to the other two and said, “Remember, don't show any fear and stay by me.”

That's when I witnessed one of the most amazing things in my life. The three tribesmen locked arms and casually walked directly toward a large pack of ferocious, man-eating lions, while they were tearing into their fresh kill.

What was even more amazing was that when the lions noticed them coming toward them, they all scattered like common house cats!


The leader of the three men took out a long blade; cut off a portion of meat, hung it over his shoulder and said, “Let's go before they realize what we've done.” They locked arms and departed just as calmly as they arrived.

Amazed, I remembered 1 Peter 5:8 and knew a solid principle from this example. When we're tempted or even battling sin, we need to lock arms with fellow believers, for support, and approach the issue head on without fear.

It was then that I went back to 1 Peter and read verse 9 as well. “Resist him, firm in your faith, knowing that the same kinds of suffering are being experienced by your brotherhood throughout the world.” What better call to action could be given in the support of a fellow brother? We must lean on one another for support, direction, and personal accountability.

I'll close with this thought; if temptation starts with a thought, and sin is a product of that thought in action, then best way to curb sin is our lives, after prayer and faith in Christ, address our thoughts so that they don't turn into actions.

Philippians 4:8 specifically tells us what to think about! Think about what is true, honorable, just, pure, lovely, commendable, excellent and praise worthy! These can't lead because no fault is found in them. And when we have our minds locked on these things and Christ, the enemy will have choice but to move to other “hunting grounds”.
